

Third Sunday of Easter - Fr Tracy O'Sullivan, OCarm

Dear Friends,

This is the third of seven weeks in the Easter Season. The Resurrection stories and the Gospel reflections all invite us to enter into the mystery of the risen Christ. It is a journey from the head to the heart.

Today's story of the two disciples on the road to Emmaus is especially heartfelt. The two disciples tell the story to Jesus. For them it is a profound tragedy. They are frustrated and floundering in a world of shattered dreams. Their story conveys pain and hopelessness. In particular, they pass over the message of the women with the account of the empty tomb and the angels.

Jesus takes their story and transforms it into a message of hope and life. He showed that the mystery of the Cross unveiled the deepest level of reality. In God's wisdom weakness gives way to true power, emptiness expresses the fullness of God's presence and death gives way to life

everlasting. This is the story of the Alleluia! "Then they said to each other, "Were not our hearts burning within us while He spoke to us on the way and opened the Scriptures to us?"" (Lk 24:32)

In the disciples' experience we have a fundamental insight into

the Christian life. We need to measure the Gospel story against our life experience. Sooner or later, we run up against the common human fate of broken dreams, love rejected and the multiple consequences of our mortality. Much of our life's efforts tries to cover all the contingencies but in the end we are not ready for what life has in store for us. Who could ever really envision the coronavirus and its impact on our world? Or who could believe the number of mass shootings being greater than the number of days in the year? We are like the disciples engulfed in dreams of great things coming from Jesus, the one who would be their savior. Yet, like them, our vision of life holds no room for the rejection and Passion and Crucifixion on that fateful weekend.

Comparable to the disciples on the road to Emmaus, we have to bring faith to the story. With faith we enter the story of the Scriptures and slowly we see that God is with us all along. This is the story of the Alleluia!

Luke uses the phrase "opened eyes" six of the eight times It appears in the New Testament. It is

always about the journey from the head to the heart. "While he was with them at table, he took bread, said the blessing, broke it, and gave it to them. With that their eyes were opened and they recognized him, but he vanished from their sight." (Lk 24:31-32) When we recognize Jesus, we begin to see the Resurrection for what it is. The victory of love over all. All is not lost. Indeed, the victory is ours when we walk with Jesus. This is the story of the Alleluia!

Thomas Merton has a beautiful definition of prayer: Prayer is yearning to be in the presence of God, a personal understanding of His Word, knowledge of His will and the capacity to hear and obey. This is what happened to the disciples in their encounter with Jesus. They were walking away from life. They were fleeing the difficulty of their broken dreams. God's grace opened the eyes of their heart to the fire of love that was there all the time. Now, they were ready to return to Jerusalem and do God's work.

The power of deep personal prayer can do the same for us. We can begin to see reality as pregnant with hope and new possibilities once we encounter the Risen Christ in deep and trusting faith. We need the Word of God to enter into the gracious presence. We need the Word of God to give us direction on the road so we

too can find our way back to the Jerusalem that is God's loving plan for us. This is the story of the Alleluia!

Prayer needs to lead us to the Eucharistic encounter where we meet Jesus in the Word and Sacrament. In telling the story in God's Word and breaking the bread, God touches the depth of the heart with the Bread of Life that is the risen Savior on 'our road to Emmaus', the struggle of our daily life.

Faith lets us see that Jesus turning the story of the two disciples and our story upside down as he did with so many experiences in his gospel teachings. Through the mystery of the Cross, he unveiled the deepest level of reality. In in this revelation of God's wisdom, weakness gives way to true power, emptiness expresses the fullness of God's presence and death opens the way to life that is everlasting. This is the story of the Alleluia!





Third Sunday of Easter - Reflection by Gardis Watts, Tolton Scholar



If you are like me, you probably had a point in your life where you set a goal to lose weight. You set a goal on how many pounds you would like your weight to be at and then work hard over a period of time shedding those pounds. The amount of time you put into exercising and the effort of forging a disciplined diet to enhance your efforts of losing weight becomes your ultimate endeavor. And then when your pants are a little loose and your shirt doesn't seem so tight, you weigh yourself and you discover that you exceeded your goal. Hooray! Now that I have achieved that, I feel like I deserve a treat. All those delicious foods that I restricted myself from eating will be my reward for working so hard. We don't just eat it on that day, we eat it the next day, and the next day, and the next day. And as soon as you know it, that weight we worked so hard to shed is back faster than we can say 'cheesecake.'

Many of us are familiar with this situation. And even if this is not your experience, how many of us have reached a goal and then immediately set themselves back achieving their goal? How many of us stopped educating ourselves after achieving a diploma or degree? How many athletes do you see nealect their workouts when they reach professional status? When was the last time you worked hard for an opportunity and discovered it was not as fulfilling as you thought it was. We just completed Lent. How many of us have gone back to the habits we restricted ourselves from doing during those forty days?

We often make the failure undervaluing the journey. In this week's Gospel reading, we see two of Jesus disciples severely ignoring the journey to a point where they do not even recognize the man they call the Messiah. These two disciples were travelling down a road to a town called Emmaus. While they were travelling, they met up with a man they did not recognize at that point. The text identifies the man as Jesus but because the two travelers' eyes were blind to their trauma of Jesus being killed, they did not recognize him. Jesus asks them what were they talking about and they proceeded to express their depression on how

their leader was betrayed by the chief priest and handed over to the Romans to be executed. They got reports of him being alive by some women who went to the tomb and did not see Jesus' body. Unfortunately, even after other disciples verified Jesus' body missing from the tomb, they still had their doubts. Jesus, still not known to the travelers, explained to them about the fulfillment of scriptures and how Jesus would have to suffer in order to come into glory. As they got to Emmaus, they invited Jesus to stay with them for the night. At dinner, they finally recognized him when he said the blessing and gave them the bread he blessed. Then suddenly, Jesus disappeared and they pondered why their hearts were burning when he spoke to them about the fulfillment of scripture. They went back to Jerusalem and told the rest of the followers what happened to them.

The Road to Emmaus is an experience we all have faced. Many times, we focus so much on the goal that we fail to realize that it is the journey that shapes us. We must understand that the journey is not just about accomplishing a goal but about transformation. In this process of transformation, we must not lose focus on our development, which can easily be neglected when we aim our attention at our deficiencies. The two disciples going to Emmaus was so immersed in their anauish and confusion about what happened to Jesus that they did not see Jesus right before their eyes. And while they admitted that their hearts were burning when Jesus was with them, they ignored it during that time. As with the travelers to Emmaus, we ignore our true calling to Jesus because just like with the disciples going to Emmaus, they paid little to no attention to who was accompanying them on their journey.

When we reflect on our lives, let us not ignore the journey we are currently on. Let us also understand that the resurrected Jesus is still with us. Despite the hardships and agony we are facing in this world, Jesus is travelling with us. With Jesus as a companion on our road to salvation, our journey can shape us to be better followers of Christ.






