Reflection on the Readings - Sister Joanne Delahanty



GAUDETE!

Once upon a time, before we began to sing as the presider and cross-bearer and proclaimers of the Word process into church at the beginning of Mass, we either recited or sang an entrance verse, or antiphon, in Latin. For this Sunday, the beginning of that verse went like this:

Gaudete in Domino semper. Rejoice in the Lord always. Gaudete. Rejoice.

Today is still called Gaudete Sunday. There is a shift in the yearning of Advent. Even the vestment color is different. We're close to Christmas now. Joy.

In the Middle Ages, joy was used as a verb. I love that. Think of it. "I joy in you." "I joy in the sunset." "I joy in Chicago-style pizza." Here's the kicker: "God joys in us."

Joy is very important to Pope Francis. He thinks that a joyful believer is the best possible way to bring people to Jesus. I think he's on to something.

Joy is work. Right now it is Advent work. Today's Gospel faces us with the work of it. John, imprisoned, sends some of his disciples to ask Jesus if he is the one who is to come, or should they look for another? Jesus answers with evidence: Pay attention to what is seen and heard.

John and friends had to change what they thought, for Jesus was not what they expected. Yet John, imprisoned, had joy in the answer his disciples brought him, <u>because he did not let his expectations restrict God's action in life</u>. That kind of openness does not come without a lot of soul-work.

The Set Aside Prayer goes something like this: "God, please help me to set aside everything I think I know about myself and You, so that I may have a new experience of both." Therein lies the secret. Don't limit God or yourself. Resilience, openness, and adaptability seem to be key in this journey of faith and kingdom-building. That is work. And joy is the fruit of it.

Joy does not depend on what happens to us or goes on around us, because it comes from the grace of God's presence in us. We don't deserve that presence, or earn it. It's gift. Joy comes from leaning into that connection, that presence, WITHOUT CONDITION. We can't think: "If I don't have cancer, then I'll have joy." or "If my child makes good choices, then I'll have joy." or "If I win the lottery, then I'll have joy." or "If my neighbor is nicer to me, then I'll have joy." or "If fighting stops in Ukraine and Myanmar, then I'll have joy."

None of that. IN **EVERYTHING**, JOY!

It is a responsibility. And it leads to endless possibilities! Think of the ways you will come to know God! Gaudete!

Reflections on 3rd Sunday of Advent - Fr. Tracy O'Sullivan, O.Carm.



Dear Friends,

The message of Advent has many rich and beautiful dimensions. Most center on the coming of the Lord. Today we are called to experience this coming in the saving acts of Jesus as seen in the past and experienced in our life today.

In today's Scripture, Isaiah draws a poetic picture of the Jews walking away into freedom after fifty years of anguish and exile in Babylonia. He uses his beautiful and poetic language to mirror the great event of the Old Testament, the Exodus from slavery to the Promised Land.

We have to see our life's struggles in this context of these biblical journeys to freedom. Jesus says," Go tell John what you hear and (Mt 11:4) The real message of Advent makes us able to see that not only are the blind given sight but the lame who now are able to leap like stags are even ready to go Dancing with the Stars. This is because the Advent message tells us that our reality is pregnant with a graciousness that our faith in Jesus brings to life as we recall the Incarnation. We do need to let the cry of Advent burst forth from our hearts: Come, Lord Jesus! Even more, we need to let this hunger in our heart for a new day lead us to live the Gospel message. We have to walk in the footsteps of Jesus today. Our lived commitment brings the transformation of reality we yearn for right now. A life lived in love is the greatest foundation for the fullness of salvation we long for in the future.

Jesus' message to John in today's Gospel is clear. There is a new day breaking through in his conquest of evil and the demonic power in his healing miracles. Just as the return of the Exiles from Babylonia mirrored the freedom of the great act of deliverance in the journey of people out of Egypt, God continues to manifest the great saving action of Jesus in our day.

Just as the return of the Exiles from Babylonia mirrored the freedom of the great act of liberation in the passage of people out of Egypt, our loving God still manifests the saving action of Jesus in our day.

The battle of good and evil still dominates our world. The pull to freedom, the quest for happiness and security still only find a lasting solution in Jesus. Jesus alone still possesses both the message and the power to draw us into eternal life. We still are the blind, the lame and the sinners that need healing and mercy. The answer to our deliverance from the overwhelming power of evil in our day is the found in our Advent prayer, **Come Lord Jesus!**

While we wait, we have to address our life situation now. St. Teresa of Avila gives us the direction in her classic Book Marker Prayer:

Let nothing disturb you,
Let nothing make you afraid.
All things are passing.
God alone never changes.
Patience gains all things.
If you have God you will want for nothing.
God alone suffices.

The Jesse Tree Tradition

The Jesse Tree was created to help people remember the events leading up to Jesus' birth. The tradition of decorating the Jesse Tree is very old and dates back to medieval times. Advent means "coming". It is a season of preparation and anticipation for the coming of Christ. It is usually recognized as the 28 days leading up to Christmas.

Our Advent Journey- Our Jesse Tree has 28 ornaments, one for each day of Advent. The picture on each ornament symbolizes a story from the Bible leading up to the birth of Christ. Each week of Advent our tree will feature a set of 7 new ornaments. Below the ornament will be a corresponding scripture and explanation to guide us through Jesus' human family tree. Have fun!

Who Is Jesse?--Before you get started on this journey, you might be wondering...Who was Jesse? The tree is named for Jesse, the father of the Great King David– who is a descendant of Jesus. The stump symbolizes Jesse. The branch growing out of the stump symbolizes the family line.

There is a scripture in the Book of Isaiah that prophesied the coming of Jesus. "A shoot will come up from the stump of Jesse; from his roots a Branch will bear fruit. The spirit of the LORD will rest on Him." Isaiah 11:1 (Continued on page 7)

Sunday, December 11, 2022 Solomon Read Kings 3:3-14

Solomon followed his father, David, as king of Israel. God had offered Solomon anything he wished for and was pleased when instead of riches or glory Solomon asked for wisdom to rule his kingdom. Solomon is also remembered for the beautiful temple he built for God in Jerusalem. The temple served the people of Israel as the central place of worship for over 350 years.



Monday, December 12, 2022 Elijah Read Kings 2:11-18

The prophet Elijah lived 900 years before Jesus at a time when Israel was ruled by weak kings, and the people worshiped false gods. God gave Elijah much spiritual power to convince the Israelites to return to their true God. When his job on earth was done, God sent a chariot of fire that swept Elijah up to heaven in a whirlwind.



Tuesday, December 13, 2022 Isaiah

Read Isaiah 2:4; 7:14; 9:6-7

Isaiah, another great prophet of the Old Testament, lived near the city of Jerusalem about 700 years before Christ. He gave hope to the Israelites that peace would come to their nation, "and they shall beat their swords into plowshares". He also foretold the birth of a child who would be called "Emmanuel." which means "God is with us." This child was Jesus.



Wednesday, December 14, 2022
Daniel
Read Daniel 6:10-23

Daniel was among the people of God who were captured by King Nebuchadnezzar and taken to Babylon. There Daniel became a friend and advisor to the king. One day, the king was tricked by jealous nobles into signing a law that condemned Daniel to death. For praying to his God, Daniel was thrown into the lion's den. But Daniel was not harmed. God answered his prayers and sent an angel to shut the lions' mouths.



Thursday, December 15, 2022 Jonah Read Jonah 1-4

Jonah was told by God to go to the city of Nineveh to warn the people to turn away from their wicked ways. Instead of obeying God, Jonah tried to run away. He boarded a ship, but God sent a storm and Jonah was tossed overboard and swallowed by a whale. Jonah lived within the whale for three days praying to God to forgive him. Finally, the whale spit him out on dry land. This time, Jonah obeyed and preached God's message so well that all the people of Nineveh repented and were saved.



Friday, December 16, 2022 Zechariah and Elizabeth Read Luke 1:5-23

Elderly Zechariah and his wife
Elizabeth (who was Mary's cousin)
prayed for many years for God to
give them a child. One day an
angel appeared to Zechariah
and told him Elizabeth would
bear him a son who was to be
named John. John would be the
prophet promised by God to help
prepare the people for the
coming of the Savior. Because
Zechariah could not believe what
the angel told him, he was made
mute and could not speak until
after his son was born.



Saturday, December 17, 2022 John the Baptist Read Matthew 3:1-11

Six months before Jesus was born, Elizabeth gave birth to a son and she and Zechariah named him John, just as the angel had instructed. When John grew up, he preached that the people should repent of their sins and be baptized. He baptized hundreds of people, including his cousin Jesus.

This is how he became known as John the Baptist. John's symbol is the shell.
