

The Jesse Tree Tradition

The Jesse Tree was created to help people remember the events leading up to Jesus' birth. The tradition of decorating the Jesse Tree is very old and dates back to medieval times. Advent means "coming". It is a season of preparation and anticipation for the coming of Christ. It is usually recognized as the 28 days leading up to Christmas.

Our Advent Journey- Our Jesse Tree has 28 ornaments, one for each day of Advent. The picture on each ornament symbolizes a story from the Bible leading up to the birth of Christ. Each week of Advent our tree will feature a set of 7 new ornaments. Below the ornament will be a corresponding scripture and explanation to guide us through Jesus' human family tree. Have fun!

Who Is Jesse?--Before you get started on this journey, you might be wondering...Who was Jesse? The tree is named for Jesse, the father of the Great King David– who is a descendant of Jesus. The stump symbolizes Jesse. The branch growing out of the stump symbolizes the family line .

There is a scripture in the Book of Isaiah that prophesied the coming of Jesus. "A shoot will come up from the stump of Jesse; from his roots a Branch will bear fruit. The spirit of the LORD will rest on Him." Isaiah 11:1 (Continued on page 7)

Reflections on 4th Sunday of Advent - Fr. Tracy O'Sullivan, O.Carm.

Dear Friends,

All religious experience tries to balance two dominant forces that flow from being a creature in the presence of the Creator: comfort and challenge. Only a mature faith is able to balance the two in a creative tension.

In today's Gospel story we have two phrases that are profoundly comforting: "be not afraid" and "Emmanuel" which means God is with us. These phrases mark the change in focus of the Advent message. The Incarnation of the coming Christmas Season is moving to center stage. Each of today's readings is on this theme. Emanuel is born in time to be forever with his people and to call his people to be forever in the love of our saving God.

While the phrase "**be not afraid**" is used over three hundred times in Scripture, the Infancy narratives of Luke and Matthew convey this expression four times. It is always related to the supportive presence of God in a challenging situation such as Joseph's dilemma with Mary's pregnancy.

Just like the great ambiguity that Mary and Joseph faced, our lives are engulfed with the consequences of evil in our midst. Sickness, ignorance, prejudice, violence, and hatred come at us in all manner of ways. This is the reality of living with the seemingly endless battle of good and evil that is our daily fare. No sooner has Covid been reduced as a threat, than we have Putin's war in the Ukraine. This incredible horror confronts us with human carnage, destruction of the environment, threat of nuclear disaster and the waste of all these resources to the neglect of the poor and hungry. This gross manifestation of evil affects everyone.

"Emmanuel "reveals God's faithfulness and involvement in all human reality. God is always present calling us into the mystery of new life and

new love. On this fourth Sunday of Advent, we begin to recall the great event of God becoming human in the person of Jesus. This is the ultimate revelation of God's saving involvement in our broken world. It is a call to new life and new love. Our challenge is to be open and accepting of the call on God's terms.

While "be not afraid" and "Emmanuel" are profoundly comforting statements, Mary and Joseph needed all the support they could get. If you do the minimal analysis of their situation, the challenge to their relationship was enormous. Anytime the betrothed says she became pregnant by the Holy Spirit, where does the dialogue go from there? Add the fact that the child is to be the Savior of his people, the only saving grace would have to be divine intervention. That's what happened!

Mary and Joseph had to dig deep into the comforting and reassuring message of the angel to make any kind of sense of the reality of their poverty and uprooting that was part of the crisis that engulfed them. It truly challenged them to look with faith on the baby born in circumstances of such total vulnerability.

On this fourth Sunday of Advent as we recall the wonder of God's becoming flesh, we are invited to embrace the great gift of Emmanuel. God is with us in love, mercy and saving grace in the person of Jesus, the son of Mary. Our challenge is to respond to this call of love on God's terms.

For Mary, it was just the beginning of a long journey of confusion and bewilderment. Only her faith and trust could comfort her in the midst of a challenge that ultimately brought her to the foot of the Cross.

When you think about it, it is similar to our journey! It is no wonder that the great prayer of Advent is so relevant to our life. **Come, Lord Jesus!**





Sunday, December 18, 2022 Anne and Joachim

According to tradition, Anne and Joachim were the parents of Mary, the mother of Jesus. The book is the symbol of the way St Anne taught Mary. It was from her that Mary heard the story of the chosen people and of the Messiah who was to save the whole world. Little did Mary realize that one day God would choose her to be the mother of his Son.



Monday, December 19, 2022 Mary Read Luke 1:26-38

God sent the angel Gabriel to

Mary in Nazareth. Gabriel told her the Lord was with her and that she was chosen among all women to bear God's Son, the king of all people, whom she should name Jesus. Mary answered "I am the Lord's servant. May it happen to me as you have said." The symbol of a loving heart represents Mary, our mother in heaven.



Tuesday, December 20, 2022 Joseph of Nazareth

Read Matthew 1:18-25

Joseph was a descendant of King David, and worked as a carpenter. While he was engaged to Mary, an angel appeared to him and told him that Mary had conceived a son by the power of the Holy Spirit and that this son would be the Messiah. Joseph agreed to take Mary as his wife, as the angel instructed and he loved and protected Jesus, the Son of God, as his foster son.



Wednesday, December 21, 2022 Star of Bethlehem Read Matthew 2:1-6

Many years before, the prophet Micah had predicted that from the town of Bethlehem a ruler would come who would save Israel. And so it happened that a census was ordered and Marv and Joseph had to travel to Bethlehem to be taxed. They stayed in a stable because there was no room for them in the inn. And while they were there Mary gave birth to Jesus. That night a special bright star shone in the sky over the place where Jesus was.



Thursday, December 22, 2022 Shepherds Read Luke 2:8-20

On the night Jesus was born. there were some shepherds in the fields keeping watch over their flocks. An angel appeared to them and told them their Savior had been born. They hurried off and found Mary and Joseph and saw Baby Jesus lying in a manger. The shepherds were the first to welcome Jesus and they went away singing praises to God for all they had heard and seen.



Friday, December 23, 2022 **Anaels** Read **Luke 2:8-14**

The angel of the Lord who appeared to the shepherd announced: "I bring you good news of the great joy for all the people, for unto you is born in the city of David, a Savior, who is Christ the Lord." Suddenly the sky was filled with a great choir of angels, singing their praise to God: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace and good will to all people."

As the star shone down from on high, Jesus lay in his manger bed, the greatest sign of God's infinite love for his people.
