

Upcoming Events



We are pleased to welcome Father John Atoyebi for our Advent Revival. It will take place on December 6th at noon.

Fr. John Bola Atoyebi was born in Lagos, Nigeria. He attended grade school and high school in Nigeria.

He began his college

education in Nigeria and completed it in Rome in 1986. While studying in Rome, he met an American priest who encouraged him to be-

come a priest in America. He was very reluctant at first but later accepted in 1987. He came to the United States on December 1, 1987, where he lived in Houston, Texas, for 18 months. He moved to Chicago in 1991 and resided at St. Philip Neri. He was ordained on May 21, 1994, becoming the first African in the Archdiocese. His first assignment was as an Associate Pastor at Benedict from 1994 – 1999.

In 1999, he was appointed Pastor of St. Clotilde, making him the first African to be appointed Pastor of a Church in Chicago. On February 6, 2006, he was appointed Pastor of Holy Angels Church.

Father John is now assisting at Ss. Peter and Lambert Parish in Skokie, Illinois.

The Jesse Tree Tradition

The Jesse Tree was created to help people remember the events leading up to Jesus' birth. The tradition of decorating the Jesse Tree is very old and dates back to medieval times. Advent means "coming". It is a season of preparation and anticipation for the coming of Christ. It is usually recognized as the 28 days leading up to Christmas.

Our Advent Journey- Our Jesse Tree has 28 ornaments, one for each day of Advent. The picture on each ornament symbolizes a story from the Bible leading up to the birth of Christ. Each week of Advent our tree will feature a set of 7 new ornaments. Below the ornament will be a corresponding scripture and explanation to guide us through Jesus' human family tree. Have fun!

Who Is Jesse?--Before you get started on this journey, you might be wondering...Who was Jesse? The tree is named for Jesse, the father of the Great King David– who is a descendant of Jesus. The stump symbolizes Jesse. The branch growing out of the stump symbolizes the family line .

There is a scripture in the Book of Isaiah that prophesied the coming of Jesus. "A shoot will come up from the stump of Jesse; from his roots a Branch will bear fruit. The spirit of the LORD will rest on Him." Isaiah 11:1 (Continued on page 7)

Reflections on 2nd Sunday of Advent - Fr. Tracy O'Sullivan, O.Carm.



Dear Friends,

One of Advent's many challenges is an invitation to ponder the Christian perspective on time. Time, for the Christian, is not the relentless and isolated moving of the hands on the clock. It is not the mindless and purposeless waiting for Godot. The Christ event has made time pregnant with the endless possibility of new life. Time is the messenger of God calling us into a gracious future where a new day will prevail.

In Advent, we see the mystery of time intimately connected to the past, present and future in the Christ event. The past recalls in the Incarnation of the Word. The present is the encounter with God's grace leading us to walk with Jesus in the concrete responsibilities and relationships in our daily life. The future is the final completion of Christ's victory in his Second Coming, the final fulfillment of human history.

To understand this mystery of time, we look back to the events of our saving past. Today, it is Isaiah who presents the beautiful passage of hope that foreshadows the coming of Christ.

"Justice shall be the band around his waist, and faithfulness a belt upon his hips.

Then the wolf shall be a guest of the lamb, and the leopard shall lie down with the kid:

The calf and the young lion shall browse together, with a little child to guide them.

The cow and the bear shall be neighbors, together their young shall rest;

The lion shall eat hay like the ox. The baby shall play by the cobra's den, and the child lay his hand on the adder's lair. There shall be no harm or ruin on all my holy mountain; for the earth shall be filled with knowledge of the Lord, as water covers the sea" (Is 11:5-9).

Advent, more than anything else, is a time of joyful and purpose-filled waiting for God who has assured us of his coming.

The Gospel today draws us to John the Baptist. John tells us this gracious waiting for the Lord is not a passive event. Our role is as participant not as spectator. It is a call that generates true changes in our life, genuinely seeking to be faithful to Jesus' call. It is a call to prepare for Christ as the total mystery of the Word made flesh, not a nostalgic and play-acting return to the beauty of Bethlehem. We need to recall the entire Jesus event. This includes his challenging message and the saving events of the death and resurrection.

In facing Jesus, we understand John's message to "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Matt 3:20). More than anything else, the Advent message demands that we change our lives as we prepare for the coming of the Lord. It is a call for the transforming event of conversion, an absolute change of mind and will. It is a response to God's continual knocking at the human heart.

The waiting of Advent is not like the drudgery of getting stuck in traffic nor is it the seemingly endless line in the market. Nor is it the anxiety-driven time waiting for the results of a test or other life-changing news from a doctor. Advent waiting is a joyful anticipation of new life. This new life demands a creative openness that leads to repentance and conversion. We need place ourselves in God's hands with a deep sense of trust and faith. We prepare for all of this Advent waiting with the special prayer of the season, **Come, Lord Jesus!**

Sunday, December 4, 2022 Moses Read Exodus 20:1-17

It was during the time when the people of Israel had become slaves in Egypt that God saved the life of a little Hebrew baby who was placed in a basket among the reeds of a river. The baby was Moses, and when he was grown, God chose him to lead the Hebrew people out of Egypt and slavery. In the desert on the way to the Promised Land, Moses climbed Mount Sinai. There God gave him the Ten Commandments, the laws God wants us all to obey.



Wednesday, December 7, 2022 Samson Read Judges 16: 21-30

Years later, the Israelites became enslaved by the Philistines, and God sent them a new leader with incredible strength, Samson. After winning many victories for his people, Samson was tricked and captured. Taken to the pagan temple of the Philistines, Samson stood between two pillars and knocked them down, causing the destruction of the temple and all the Philistines who were inside it.



Monday, December 5, 2022 Aaron

Read **Exodus 5: 22, 11:5**

God told Moses to let his brother Aaron speak for him in trying to persuade the Pharaoh to let the Hebrew people leave Egypt. To show how powerful his God was, Aaron threw down his rod before the Pharaoh and it became a serpent, swallowing up the serpents that had been produced by the Pharaoh's magicians and sorcerers.



Thursday, December 8, 2022 Ruth Read Ruth 1: 15-18

The symbol of gathered wheat stands for Ruth, who collected grain from the fields of an Israelite farmer in Bethlehem. She was a foreigner who had married a Hebrew, and after his death she took care of his mother Naomi and remained faithful to his God. Later she married the farmer in whose fields she worked, and God rewarded her goodness by sending her a son, Obed. Obed became the father of Jesse and the grandfather of the great Jewish king David.



Tuesday, December 6, 2022 Joshua

Read Joshua 6:20

Moses died before he got to the Promised Land, and Joshua was appointed the new leader of the Hebrew people, Joshua planned to capture the city of Jericho. He ordered the Israelites to march around the city seven times. Then, when the priests blew their trumpets and the people shouted, the walls of the mighty city fell.



Friday, December 9, 2022 Jesse Read Isaiah 11: 1-2

Many years after Jesse lived, the prophet Isaiah would foretell the coming of the Messiah and would trace Jesus' ancestry back to Jesse. "There shall come forth a shoot from the stump of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots." And so it was in the family line of Jesse that Jesus Christ was born in fulfillment of the prophecies.



Saturday, December 10, 2022 David Read Samuel 5: 1-5

The Star of David has come to represent the nation of Israel. As a shepherd boy, David's faith in God enabled him to slay the giant Goliath. Later he became a king and ruled Jerusalem for thirty-three years. He was a great king because he trusted God and tried to obey him. David made some mistakes, but he continued to turn to God for forgiveness and guidance, and Israel became a strong nation under his leadership.

Dear Friends in Christ,

On the Third Sunday of Advent, our parishes will be conducting the Retirement Fund for Religious collection, an annual appeal that benefits nearly 25,000 elderly sisters, brothers, and religious order priests. Our senior religious are a treasure—both for their service to our Church and for the ways their prayer and witness enrich our faith. "Planted in the house of the Lord, they shall flourish in the courts of our God. They shall bear fruit even in old age" (Ps 92:14-15). As I reflect on the ministry of women and men religious—past and present—I am grateful for the ways they have shaped my own faith.
