

Our African-American Candidates for Sainthood



Saintly Servant: The life and legacy Pierre Toussaint

Two of the six African Americans on the Road to Sainthood did not belong to the clergy or religious order. One was a layman who answer the call to serve God and God's people in his everyday life. He did this despite being formerly enslaved. For Pierre Toussaint, it was his selfless humility, love of God, and love for humanity that gave him the strength to serve those who considered them less than full people.

"I have enough for myself, but if I stop working I have not enough for others." - Pierre Toussaint

Pierre Toussaint was born into slavery in the French colony of Saint Domingue (Haiti) around June 27, 1766. Pierre's master, Jean Berard

encouraged Pierre to read and write, a practice that was frowned upon during that time. As the Haitian slaves strengthen and later revolted, Jean, his wife, and some of the slaves moved to New York City in the newly formed country of the United States.

Pierre learned the art of hairdressing and soon developed a good reputation among the New York elites in that field. When his master died, he continued to support Berard's widow with his earnings as a hairdresser. At the death of Madame Berard, Pierre was given his freedom in 1807. He was also able to save enough money to purchase his sister's freedom. As a free man at the age of forty-one, Pierre married Juliette.

Pierre and Juliette's charitable work included helping Haitian refugees find jobs, caring for orphans, opening a school to teach black children a trade, and helping to raise funds to build Saint Patrick's Cathedral on Mulberry Street. When the plague struck New York, Pierre personally cared for the victims. When Pierre's sister, Rosalie, died leaving an orphaned young daughter, Euphemia, Pierre, and Juliette welcomed her into their home. Pierre Toussaint, a great man of faith who used his time, talents, and treasures to help others, died at the age of 87 in New York City in 1853.

In 1968, Cardinal Cooke introduced Pierre's cause for canonization at the Vatican. In December 1989, Cardinal O'Connor had the remains of Pierre Toussaint transferred from Lower Manhattan to St. Patrick's Cathedral in midtown Manhattan where he is buried as the only lay person, alongside the former Cardinal-Archbishops of New York City and on December 17, 1997, Pope John Paul II declared Pierre Toussaint, Venerable. *Continued on page 6*

Dr. Aaron Matthews earned a Bachelor of Arts in Piano Performance from Morehouse College, a Master of Music in Piano Pedagogy from Georgia State University, and a Doctor of Musical Arts in Piano Pedagogy from the University of South Carolina. He has served on the music faculty of Allen University, Viterbo University, Xavier University of Louisiana, and Alverno College.

Dr. Matthews serves as the Music Director of St. Charles Parish and School in Hartland, Wisconsin. Dr. Matthews was overjoyed to have returned to St. Charles in June 2022, having first served there from 2015 to 2019.

The second layperson on the path toward sainthood is Julia Greeley. She did not allow her circumstances or limitations to stop her from serving God and God's people to the best of her ability. It was despite the ugliness and darkness of racism and inequality that the light of Christ within her shone the brightest. We celebrate and honor this humble woman of strong faith as her life and legacy continue to shine and guide the way for us today.

Born between 1833-1848 Julia Greeley was born enslaved in Hannibal, Missouri. Her right eye was permanently injured as a child due to a beating. In 1865, Julia, like millions of other enslaved African Americans, became free. She continued to work for the family who enslaved her, and they eventually moved to Denver, Colorado in 1879. While in Denver, Julia was baptized into the Catholic Church on June 26, 1880, at Sacred Heart Church and became especially devoted to the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, the Blessed Virgin Mary, and the Holy Eucharist, receiving Holy Communion daily. In 1901, Greeley joined the Secular Franciscans and remained an active member for the rest of her life.

Julia began to do labor work for several wealthy white families. With this money she made, she gave it away to people who needed it. Julia would pull a red wagon through the streets of Denver in the cover of the night to bring food, coal, and clothing to needy families. She made her rounds in darkness so as not to embarrass white families ashamed to accept charity from a poor, black woman. Julia even gave her burial plot to a man who was going to be buried in the pauper's field.

It was only after her death in 1918 that many of the families that she helped realized that it came from Julia. She was officially named "Denver's Angel of Charity". She was laid in repose in Loyola Chapel in Denver and later buried in Mount Olivet Cemetery.

Her cause for canonization was opened by Archbishop Samuel J. Aquila in 2016 and her body was moved to Denver's Cathedral Basilica of the Immaculate Conception.

He and his wife Annie are active in the St. Vincent de Paul Society, the Tolton Ambassadors of Indiana, and Youth & Young Adult Ministry at their home parish.
