



# 1st Sunday of Lent - New Contributor Clarissa V. Aljentera



The last time my family and I took a trip, we packed our car and went toward the shores of Lake Michigan. We decided to go 'glamping,' which means I have certain comforts I desire. My family, on the other hand, might not share those same desires.

In the weeks and days we prepared for the trip, I would make lists of food and supplies to ensure our almost weeklong trip would be comfortable. There was the checking of the weather that week and looking for activities.

There was much preparation that went into our adventure. You may be the same way with lists and tasks to ensure your time away is enjoyable. Or throw caution to the wind and pack the morning before you hop in the car.

In these last few days, we entered the season of Lent, a journey of sorts. It is the season when we strip away the comforts and pay more attention to our prayer life and relationship with Jesus. We may have fallen back on things we decided to give up for Lent, such as coffee, sweets, and screen time. Participating in weekly Stations of the Cross or trying to pray at home might be more our speed this Lent.

There's a cadence to our time during these 40 days. We mark our Fridays by abstaining from meat. We begin with ashes on our foreheads. We are asked to turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel. The hope is that this can all prepare us for Easter and a Risen Christ.

I prepare for my vacations with such thoughtfulness and care. And my Lenten journey is so hastily thought about in the hours before Ash Wednesday.

In today's Gospel of Mark, we see this urgency and that the time is now. The time isn't in a year or several months. The time is today. We see that after the temptation in the desert, Jesus was ready to go out and 'proclaim the gospel of God.' We hear that the kingdom of God is at hand.

We're almost standing on a precipice and looking down at what's next. Where would our steps and actions take us if we give in to what's next? Can we give that 'Yes' to a deeper and more engaged relationship with God?

That 'Yes' that we're looking for is what we see in the first reading from Genesis 9 – God was clear in the actions and the promises that a covenant was being established right then and there with Noah. God made a promise that no more flooding would destroy the earth and harm living beings. There was every intention of upholding and remembering.

We might not feel it, but God is pressing that urgency into our palms. Our time and our 'Yes' are for now and for today. These actions that draw us closer to our faith can be uncomfortable and even cause us pause. Ask yourself how you might push past discomfort and enter the invitation to give that 'Yes.'

# UNITY AND BLACK EXCELLENCE—OLA CHURCH MEMBER SILMON REED



Silmon Reed's roots run deep in Bronzeville. For the lifelong Catholic who was baptized, received communion, and confirmation, and attended Corpus Christi School and Hales Franciscan High School, it was only natural for him to pledge to Phi Beta Sigma fraternity incorporated when he became a student at Southern Illinois University.

Founded on January 9, 1914, at Howard University, Phi Beta Sigma's founders wanted to focus on inclusivity in addition to brotherhood, scholarship, and service. The motto for Phi Beta Sigma is "Culture For Service and Service For Humanity." For A. Langston Taylor, Leonard F. Morse, and Charles I. Brown, they desired to "create an organization that viewed itself as "a part of" the general community rather than "apart from" the general community. They believed that each potential member should be judged by his own merits rather than his family background or affluence... without regard of skin tone or texture of hair." This meant establishing some of the first chapters at other schools, alumni, and international chapters. In addition to creating a credit union, and mentoring program for youth, Phi Beta Sigma also has the unique distinction of having a constitutionally bound sister sorority in Zeta Phi Beta which was founded on January 16, 1920.

This focus of inclusivity that the Sigma men had from the beginning of their creation attracted Silmon to pledge and become a member in 1971. Following in the footsteps of notable fraternal brothers such as James Weldon Johnson, A. Phillip Randolph, Hosea Williams, Huey P. Newton, Bobby Seale, and Congressman John Lewis, who showed us how to get into good trouble, necessary trouble for the service of humanity, Silmon was able to incorporate the importance of social justice, faith, community, and solidarity that he found in the fraternity in his own life.

The advice that Silmon gives to any young man who may be interested in joining Phi Beta Sigma is to investigate and research to find out what any Greek organization stands for. Silmon also suggests that anyone interested in joining should observe the group to see if they are living out the mission and philosophy of the organization.

Still active in the philosophy of the Phi Beta Sigma, this twenty-five-year veteran of the Chicago Police Department, Silmon served as an advocate for senior citizens for the last ten years before he retired from the force. Currently, Silmon volunteers as the coordinator for youth ministry, is a lector and serves on the security ministries at Our Lady of Africa Parish. In addition to those parish ministries, Silmon is also a member of the Knights of Peter Claver.

Today, Phi Beta Sigma has over 200,000 men in several countries around the world including South Korea, Japan, Germany, Switzerland, and several countries in Africa. 
