Black Catholic History Month



Deacon Mervin Johnson

Service to God and God's people is the first thing that comes to mind when talking to Deacon Mervin O. Johnson Jr.

Born in Mobile Alabama during the height of racial discrimination, Deacon Mervin learned early on the importance of holding on to one's faith from his Latina mother. He remembers fondly his mother and father attending Novenas weekly and being very active in the Knights and Ladies of Peter Claver at St. Peter Claver parish in Mobile.

Even though Deacon Mervin attended public school, there was a practice at the time called release time, where public school children would go to their parishes to receive religious education instruction. It was at St. Peter Claver parish, that his understanding of the Catholic Church deepened.

Unfortunately, racism and colorism were alive and well in his

Mobile community. Blacks who had to attend the predominately white St. Vincent parish mass were only allowed to sit at the last two pews on the Blessed Mother's side. Being the darkest of his mother's children, he was overlooked to join some clubs until the leaders learned who his family was. Yet, ever proud of who he is and whom he belonged to, the young Mervin did not accept their invitation.

These experiences stayed with Deacon Mervin as he headed north to Chicago. He served in Seoul during the Korean conflict and when Mervin returned to Chicago after his time in the Army, he got married and had a son. By the 1970s, he was teaching at St. Leo Elementary School and within 3 years became the principal. For over 30 years, Mervin Johnson served the students and their families at St. Leo Elementary School and was active at St. Leo parish. It was through this activism that Mervin received the call to become a deacon in the church. With his wife by his side, he began the process. It was his own experiences within the church that helped his fellow deacons understand that God speaks to us all in different ways. In the mid-1980s, Mervin O. Johnson Jr. became Deacon Mervin.

Deacon Mervin's unique style of being in the pews with the parishioners helped him develop a personal relationship with those he was serving. He helped the parishioners see that he was one of them, not on the altar but with them in the trenches. When St. Leo parish and elementary school closed, Deacon Mervin and others migrated to Holy Angels. His service to God and God's people continued even after the death of his wife and son. Now in his 39th year as an Archdiocesan Deacon, Mervin Johnson continues to serve God and God's people at Our Lady of Africa as a mentor and spiritual leader sitting in the pews next to the parishioners.

Reflections on 1st Sunday of Advent - Fr. Tracy O'Sullivan, O.Carm.

Advent has us look backward so we can look forward. Both views call us to live in the present. Advent is not a penitential season but a celebration of the coming of Christ among us. A special element of Advent is the anticipation of the second coming of Christ. Both in the incarnation and the second coming we have a powerful invitation to embrace the gift of today to walk with Christ.

Isaiah is the featured Old Testament author of the Advent Season. The beauty of his poetry is filled with hope for deliverance and longing for the final expression of God's saving power.

Matthew's message today, and in this time of Advent, is based on the fundamental confidence flowing from the Christian message. Christ will return in glory and with him will come the fullness of redemption. A new day is coming. Matthew is emphatic: we need to be ready.

This longing for the return of the Lord mirrors the passionate longing expressed in Isaiah. Yet it is incredibly enriched and supported by our gift of the Gospel reality. Paul tells us, "Put on the Lord Jesus Christ and make no provision for the desires of the flesh." (Romans 13:14) So we join together in our liturgies and in our lives to proclaim the Advent yearning: **Come Lord Jesus!**

In the meanwhile, Isaiah, Paul and Matthew have a clear and simple message for us. Live today in faithfulness to the Lord. Enter into our reality. We do not know the future but we do know the present. We are called to live the Gospel with acts of mercy and forgiveness, with concern for justice and the constant struggle "to beat the swords into plowshares and the spears into pruning hooks." Isaiah 2:4)

Swords and plowshares are not our ordinary arsenal in our daily battles with one another. We often have looks and words and attitudes that are up to the task of antagonism against our neighbor. We have anger and resentments with more than enough prejudices to create walls of isolation and hostility. We have a way of making our time, interests and convenience the measure of our actions, all to the detriment of fraternal charity. More often than not this is done with a faced of righteousness. Advent is a time to put away the weapons of hostility and division and isolation. It is a time to pray with a truly humble heart, "**Come, Lord Jesus!**"

Advent challenges us to look at the lost opportunities, the time wasted and misdirected. We all have more than enough to account for. Advent calls us to gather ourselves together and live today, in the grace of the present moment for tomorrow is in God's hands. We indeed need to cry out, **Come Lord Jesus!** But a life seeking to walk with Jesus right now makes our cry all the more real and focused.

God is very capable of keeping the schedule. He will do his job of finishing the program at the appropriate time. It is quite normal for us to use that familiar question of our youth, Are we there yet? God will let us know. In the meanwhile, our task is to be faithful to the Gospel message and express the hunger in our heart for a new day with the beautiful Advent prayer, **Come Lord Jesus!**





Advent Revival



We are pleased to welcome Father John Atoyebi for our Advent Revival. <u>It will take</u> place on December 6th at noon.

Fr. John Bola Atoyebi was born in Lagos, Nigeria. He attended grade school and high school in Nigeria.


He began his college

education in Nigeria and completed it in Rome in 1986. While studying in Rome, he met an American priest who encouraged him to become a priest in America. He was very reluctant at first but later accepted in 1987. He came to the United States on December 1, 1987, where he lived in Houston, Texas, for 18 months. He moved to Chicago in 1991 and resided at St. Philip Neri. He was ordained on May 21, 1994, becoming the first African in the Archdiocese. His first assignment was as an Associate Pastor at Benedict from 1994 – 1999.

In 1999, he was appointed Pastor of St. Clotilde, making him the first African to be appointed Pastor of a Church in Chicago. On February 6, 2006, he was appointed Pastor of Holy Angels Church.

Father John is now assisting at Ss. Peter and Lambert Parish in Skokie, Illinois.
