

Pastor's Message

Dear Parishioners.

Our official celebration of Christmas ended last Monday when we celebrated the Baptism of the Lord. Usually, this celebration is on a Sunday. However, the Solemnities of Christmas and Mary, Mother of God both being on Sundays this liturgical year, the Baptism of the Lord was observed last Monday.

Thinking of my own Baptismal Call, I cannot help but think of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. He lived his Baptismal Call every day and he made a difference by challenging this nation and the dominant culture who was/is in charge to heed the real message of the Gospel. Yes, he focused his content on our United States Constitution. But he was telling us to remember and live that we are all created in the image and likeness of God.

"Dr. King's principles are meant to change us and in changing us to change our society. They are addressed first and foremost to the heart, calling us to

conversion, a conversion that leads to a different way of thinking, speaking and acting. They urge us to leave behind 'business as usual' and instead to find ways not only to come together but to stay together for the long haul, in peaceful dialogue and cooperation for the sake of each person's dignity and for the common good.

Thus, if we truly allow Dr. King's principles of nonviolence to guide us to conversion, we will not be content to camouflage our problems but rather be spurred into action; we will be moved to address and resist injustice in our community. Ultimately, however, it is only a change of. mind and heart on the part of many that will lead to a new beginning for us wherever we live in this country." (Pastoral Reflection). Dr. King's message of freedom, equality, justice, and love is still not even close to being achieved. We all know our country is more divided than ever. The acceptance of all and opportunities for all are still not there, and that list is still unending today. The Dr. King Holiday tomorrow celebrates his life of great ultimate sacrifice and service among us. May his life and work help us to live up to our Baptismal Call and make a difference!



Father Tracy's Reflection for the 2nd Sunday in Ordinary Time



Dear Friends,

This year we will walk with the Jesus of St. Mathew in our Sunday Gospel selections. I always look forward to a new journey that is the same but always deeper, always more inviting as we grow more in our personal maturity and in faith.

Today, however, we start out with a passage from the Gospel of John. It invites us to encounter Jesus as the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world. This is one of many titles John gives to Jesus such as the Light of the World, the Living Water, the Bread of Life, the Life and the Resurrection and the Life, of course, the Way, the Life and The Truth.

In John's Gospel these "I am" statements signify God speaking to us through Jesus. Jesus is the full revelation of God. To hear Jesus speak, is to hear God.

The message of today's Gospel is clear and to the point. Jesus is the fullness of God's revelation. He will lead us on the journey to salvation. We need to be faithful to his call because He has the answer to the deepest yearnings of the human heart.

John the Baptist had stirred Messianic hopes among the people. In naming Jesus "the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world"

John was doing two things. First, he was directing the Messianic hopes toward Jesus. Secondly, he was challenging the traditional view of the anticipated Messiah. Jesus directed his mission to restoring humanity's

broken relationship with God. He was not primarily a political broker attempting to restore the power, prestige and prosperity of Israel. The role of Jesus as the Lamb of God was focused on the much deeper issue of the destructive power of sin that encompassed all alienation from God. Jesus ultimately offered true freedom, peace and justice in the midst of a very broken world.

Jesus, the Lamb of God, was the perfect servant of God who gave the gift of his life: "Here I am Lord, I come to do your will." (Responsorial Psalm)

We are yearning for the answer to the hungers in our heart. It is an openness to God's call in the person of His Son. Jesus as the Lamb of God will lead us to the freedom of the Gospel message of Good News. This is why the Church begins our new journey of Ordinary Time with John whose picture of Christ is strong and forceful right from the start. With this introduction to Jesus, we join Matthew next week as our guide on the dusty roads of Galilee to encounter the Son of God who calls us out of sin to the freedom, peace and justice of love that will deliver us from our sin and the sin of the world.

Just as the disciples moved through the byways and highways of Galilee, we, too, have the opportunity to walk once again with the Son of God made flesh who calls us out of darkness into the light.

"Legacy of a King" by Tina Carter





Speak out for those who cannot speak, for the rights of all the destitute. Speak out, judge righteously, defend the rights of the poor and needy. (Proverbs 31: 8-9)

When Martin Luther King Jr. sacrificed himself on the altar of justice that fateful day on April 4th, 1968, I imagine that the cries were as loud and great as those in Egypt during the Passover or as heartfelt as seeing Christ on the cross. The entire country exploded with riots from the east coast to the west. Yet as the hurt and anger of a modern-day prophet being assassinated began to subside, it was time to continue the work that was passed on from him to us. Marches continued for equal rights and accessibility.

The Poor People's campaign went on and in early May hundreds of thousands descended on Washington, D.C. reminding the leaders that the marginalized have a voice too and were heard.

Four days after his death, there was a call to honor this man of faith and peace with a day of remembrance, Martin Luther King Jr. Day. Senator Edward W. Brooke of Massachusetts introduced the bill to make January 15th a national holiday. The road to recognition was not easy and it was long. By 1971, only a handful of

states placed Martin Luther King Jr. Day on their books. However, by 1983 and a compromise, convinced enough members of Congress to pass the bill. At the time, only two men's birthdays were celebrated as federal holidays, Christopher Columbus, and George Washington. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. is the third. President Ronald Reagan signed the bill on November 2nd, 1983, commemorating the third Monday in January as Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Day.

Now how do we honor this King, this radical man of peace? We continue the work that was given to him. We continue to use our voices to speak truth to power. We remember the lessons that were taught. We roll up our sleeves and get dirty to clean out the muck of injustice, intolerance, hatred, and bigotry by listening to one another with an open heart, an open mind, and with the eyes of God.

Dr. King's legacy is more than one speech on a hot summer day in 1963. Dr. King's life is more than the recognition and awards that he received while he walked on this earth. Dr. King showed us that if you are willing to do the work, stay the course and lean on the strength of God almighty, minds can be changed, hearts can be won over and we can get closer to the ideals that this country was founded on over 200 years ago.

Use your voice to speak out against injustice. Listen to the youth as they cry out and invite them to join the struggle. It is only through our collective voices working together as one, will we be able to change our families, our neighborhoods, our communities, and our country.

Orders of religious sisters and nuns commonly manufacture hosts as a means of supporting the work of their communities. Not only does this work offer a means of self-support for those communities, but it also forges a tangible, physical connection between the sisters and the parishes and other diocesan ministries that use the hosts at Mass and bring the Blessed Sacrament to prisoners, seniors, and others who cannot attend Mass.

The Conceptionist Sisters of Fortaleza, Brazil, is one community that makes the hosts used at Masses in the diocese. After years of manufacturing hosts, the sisters needed new, more reliable, modern equipment for baking and cutting the hosts. With the assistance of a grant from the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' Church in Latin America program, the sisters purchased new machinery that allows them to continue this work of service and unity for the local Church now and for years to come. Your generous donations to the Collection for the Church in Latin America are your way of participating in the sisters' work and that of communities throughout Latin America and the Caribbean.


