

What does Thanksgiving mean to me? Thanksgiving means I must be grateful for what God has given me. It also means that I have to share what God has given me because Jesus did not have to provide me with anything. And for me,

Thanksgiving is year-round because I have to think about who has less than I have and what I need to do to give back to my community.

Many people need help to make ends meet. There is a migrant family that has a dad, a mom, and two girls who stand outside of K and G on 76th and Stony Island. From my interactions with them, they are trying to survive. The children are a toddler, and the other is a pre-teen. I donated food for them to eat so they could have a meal once or twice a week for the past five months. I know what it means to be hungry, but I am grateful for my aunt, who will feed me McDonald's, Subway, and Popeyes when I want it. My Aunt June will slide me a gift card, but I do not see the migrants getting any food gift cards from relatives.

One day, my Nana and I drove by the migrant family in the parking lot, and the wind blew hard outside. I am grateful that I am in a warm car, but they were cold on the street. Their faces were red, and so were their hands. Nana drove to Dollar Tree and let me select the items I wanted them to have. I know what the girls in my class wear to school, so I chose things like that. I am grateful that God gave me eyes to see so I would know what girls like to wear.

We drove back to K and G, and I gave them gloves, hats, socks, and scarves to all of them. I gave the mother a shawl and felt bad we did not have enough money to buy the dad something warm to wear. I am grateful to God for prayer so I can keep praying for the dad to get some pants. I was so happy to give them these items. They were not from Macy's or designer brands, but the smiles on the girl's faces made me happy! Thank God for happiness giving me from serving strangers. Some other Black shoppers were rolling their eyes at me and being evil with their mean looks at me, and ignored their ignorance. I am thankful that God stopped me from snapping at the evil women and staying focused on the migrant family. I was happy to see them with some of the items they needed. Thank God for empathy and compassion for others. I had been giving them things since June, and it was like we were having our own Thanksgiving when I shared my sandwiches, juices, fruit, water, and new clothing items.

Thanksgiving is a year-round holiday for me, even though we celebrate it every November. This year, we had a Thanksgiving holiday in June, July, August, September, and October, and we did not have to sit around a table. We celebrated right in the parking lot and God made sure everyone had something good to be grateful for.

We have not seen the migrant family in the last four weeks. WGN news says some of the migrants are going back to Venezuela. We do not know if they went or not. I thank God for giving me concern. I am deeply concerned about them. I pray that if they leave Chicago and America, they will make it back safely and will live a better life. I thank God for giving this family to me. They helped me learn not to assume anything about strangers and not to judge them just because they were not a Black Family from the 'hood.

The reason I am thankful for them is because I can learn so much from each of them and they also take care of me. When I am having a bad day or feeling low, she always goes out of her way to make me feel better. She is not the type of person to not make sure I am ok, and I appreciate her for that.

I am also thankful for the life I have. There are a lot of people in the world both adults and children, who are suffering and are less fortunate than I am. I have a place to call home, food on the table every night, clothes on my back and I go to a good school to get an education. Many children in Gaza don't have that luxury. So, I am grateful I don't have to worry about the basic necessities of life and that feels good.

In conclusion, I know I have a lot to be thankful for and I pray that I never take any of it for granted as I know things can also be taken away. At night, before I go to sleep, I pray to God to thank him for the little things that he has blessed me with to show my gratitude. God has placed me right where I need to be in life to succeed. I have the best life and the best support system, and I can't thank him enough for that, I am truly blessed.
