Perspectives on the Gospel Readings - Tolton Scholar Gardis Watts

We live in a society that believes that certain people are cursed because of choices they made in their lives. I remember back in the 1980s at the height of the AIDS epidemic when many evangelical Christian ministers were making this crisis as a curse from God on homosexuals. It was immediately debunked when it started spreading rapidly to heterosexual people. I've heard many times that people who are homeless are lazy because they refuse to get a job. Not realizing that homelessness is a result of extreme poverty that is not caused by sloth. There are times where black people are denied opportunities because they are told that they lack intestinal fortitude. However, the system of racism exists and its purpose is to deny black people opportunities and resources. These are just a few examples of a narrow view we have of those people we can easily disparage. And because of our simplistic belief of people's suffering, we ignore social sins and lay the blame on the victims.

In this week's Gospel reading, we find Jesus and his disciples encountering a destitute beggar who has been blind his entire life. The disciples ask Jesus who was at fault for his blindness. They felt either his parents or the beggar did something wrong that made God so angry that he cursed this man to blindness. Jesus' answer to them was that neither the blind man nor his parents are at fault. Jesus then cures the man of his blindness. Once the blind man's sight is restored, some of the Jews who recognized him were initially in denial when they saw his sight was restored by passing it off as someone who looked like the blind beggar. The Pharisees questioned him about how his sight was restored, and he proclaimed Jesus as the one who cured him. They were so pessimistic of the miracle that the Pharisees questioned his parents and they verified that he was blind at birth. Despite this testimony from the parents, they still did not believe Jesus performed this miracle because they still insisted he is a sinner and sinners are not granted this type of mercy from God. While the Pharisees rejected the man's claim, the man believed that Jesus was from God.

Most of us in this society is blind to social sins because we refuse to see them and those who suffer from them. We want to believe that sin is just a personal issue, which it is. Unfortunately, sin also is a collective problem as well. Part of this is caused by a lack of love and mercy to one another. It is this spiritual darkness that does not allow us to see ourselves as a society. Once we are in the light of Christ, we are able to see the moral decay of this world and bring a light to others to usher in a just society. That same light that is talked about in our second reading from the Letter to the Ephesians where everything exposed by light will be visible. Jesus' healing of the blind man not only exposed the man's eyes to the world, but it exposes the readers to the Pharisees' hatred of Jesus and their animosity toward the man's gift of sight.

The Pharisees went to extreme lengths to try and discredit this miracle. Much of this antipathy is from an envious position that the man did not deserve such a blessing. Yet, Jesus chose him and showed enough love and compassion to heal this man from his blindness. Jesus did not choose him because of his moral status but to be an example of God's saving work. God can choose any of us for his divine work no matter who we are or what we did in the past. God can choose the ones who society deems as not worthy of the calling. In the first reading from the First Book of Samuel, David is chosen as the anointed one out of all his brothers despite him being the youngest and having the lowly job as a shepherd.

Today, many of us are blind to the grace and mercy of God. When we refuse to see one another as children of God we apply partisan judgment on those who really need the love of God the most. As the world continues to languish in darkness, let us be instruments of light to one another. Let us see the light of Jesus so we would not turn a blind eye to injustice. And let us be part of the miracle by turning the 'blind in spirit' to Jesus so he can open their eyes as he did the blind man.

Perspectives on the Gospel Readings - Marcheta Smith

Rejoice, Rejoice, and again, I say Rejoice!

As a kid I could never figure out why we called this Rejoice Sunday. I mean I understood that the Latin name meant rejoice but it still didn't make sense to me. Who rejoices in only "halfway there" instead of "done and over with?" Lent was only half over, Easter is still not here. We had "no meat Fridays" and fasting. Halving your allowance for the alms giving. Sr. Dawn expected us to rejoice and be happy. That Lent my class felt especially put upon since she had added to our joy, with our parents' permission and help. Our class was not allowed to buy snacks during recess/lunch during Lent because of prior transgressions against ourselves and Sr. Dawn. And half of the money that you saved from not buying snacks was supposed to go into the class alms jar. We were not a joy-filled class that Lent. We had the lunch/recess time to eat in silence and contemplate how you would we make amends to Sr. Dawn by the end of Lent.

Right now, as you think about this Fourth Sunday of Lent, what gives you Joy? What are you Rejoicing in? (write the answer down and put it to the side) It took me about ten years after that Lent to come up with an answer for why to Rejoice this Sunday. I (We) rejoice in God's love for me (us). Today's scripture readings, living the Christian life and Sr. Dawn have all something in common. They all share movement. We have to be willing and able to move so that we can transform our lives and the lives of those around us. My class acknowledged our faults and confessed and changed our ways so that we were renewed by Easter Monday. We Christians rejoice in God's love for us! We know that God loves us because it has been revealed in Jesus, who through his Passion, Death and Resurrection has reconciled us with God and to one another.

In the First Reading we are reminded that what we see is not necessarily what we will receive. "Man see's the appearance, but God sees into the heart". Samuel saw Eliab and by his appearance assumed he was the chosen one. God rejected him and had Samuel anoint David. The Second Reading reminds us that; "We were once darkness, but we are now light in the Lord". Saying "yes" to Christ helps us move from blindness to light. It says that we choose to see with our hearts rather than by appearance. That we choose to see and not be blind. The Gospel reminds us that "we can still see and be blind..." Jesus says that he "came into the world for Judgement, so that those who do not see, might see, and those who do see might become blind". Now take out your notes again and answer these questions. Who have you judged lately? Who have you talked about because of their sexual identity? hair color(s)? race? immigration status? appearance? status etc. What causes that blindness in us? What causes us to have that attitude or sour disposition? What causes us to think we are better than or even more holy or closer to God then the stranger, alien, or fellow church members?

Indeed, my brothers and sisters, The Scriptures let us know that if we say yes to God, we can move from blindness into the light, where we find not only God's love but his Mercy, compassion and forgiveness that we have to extend to one another.

REJOICE. REJOICE, and again I say REJOICE!

Program Goals

Mission Jamaica

Divine Word Missionaries staff seven churches in Jamaica. Three are in the civil parish of St. Thomas and four are in the greater Portmore area in and around the city of Kingston. This mission experience will be centered at St. Patrick Parish in Portmore/Kingston.

Divine Word Missionaries participate in a great diversity of ministries with the poor and marginalized, including the youth and elderly. Our missionary priests and brothers invite you to work alongside them in their ministries to serve those in need in Jamaica—to get off the sidelines and no longer be a spectator, but be an active minister of God's love.

Housing

During your stay in Jamaica, volunteers will stay at St. Patrick Parish Rectory. Accommodations are modest, but adequate. Each volunteer will have his/her own bed, though some may be a mattress on the floor. The team will prepare meals from funds provided by participants. Most evenings will be spent with fellow volunteers and missionaries discussing the day's experiences and learning more about the missionary work of the Church.

Cost

The cost of the Mission Experience trip is approximately \$1,000.

This includes air travel plus \$400. The \$400 covers the cost of housing, meals and travel while the group is in Jamaica. It also includes the cost of some supplies and materials for the housing project. Other travel is at the participant's expense.

Partial scholarships are available.

Participation Criteria

The Mission Experience trip is planned principally with Catholics in mind, but can accommodate people of other faiths under special circumstances. In addition, those wishing to participate must:

- Be 18 years or older
- Have a passport to travel outside the country
- Be physically able to participate in manual labor (painting, carrying up to 40 pounds, etc)
- Have health insurance or purchase insurance
- · Sign a liability waiver
