

Palm Sunday Reflection (Phillipians 2:6-10) - Gardis Watts



On Palm Sunday, we find the faithful commemorating Jesus' celebratory entry into the city of Jerusalem. This is signified by the waving of palm leaves given to the congregation upon the opening procession of the Mass. But as the Mass proceeds into the gospel reading, the mood gets somber. At the gospel reading, there is an active participation by the congregation of the reading of the Passion of Christ. These are the events of Jesus' time in Jerusalem all the way up until his death.

While I typically reflect on the gospel reading, I want to direct my focus on the second reading, which is a passage from Paul's letter to the Philippians. In the second reading, most biblical scholars call this passage the "Christ Hymn" of the Philippians. It is called this because the writing is poetically written by Paul describing the greatness of Jesus. This can be broken into two major parts. The first three verses is where Paul describes Jesus' humility. The last three verses explain his exaltation by God. This message lays into the heart of what Palm Sunday is about. Jesus accepting his role as a human is why he is the Christ. In accepting this role as a human, Jesus lowers himself to save humanity. If he is going to save humanity, Jesus must serve humanity. And in order to serve humanity, Jesus had to be with the people. Being with the people not only meant his presence among them but also being with them in their struggles. He took on their struggles to an extreme degree where he accepted one of the most barbaric forms of torture in human history and that is death on a cross.

What Paul conveys in this reading is what Jesus taught to his disciples in his earthly ministry. He expressed to them that the greatest among you is the servant to all and those who humble themselves will be exalted (Matt 23:11-12). This timeless message that Paul passes to the followers of Christ in his day is the main principle of discipleship. And this type of concept can only be led by love. A love that is selfless and unconditional. It is the Greek word Agape, which is an unselfish love. Jesus models this love to us by his teachings, actions and his very presence.

As we approach the conclusion of the Lenten season, let us reflect on our transformation we attempted to undertake in order to improve our spiritual lives. And as we contemplate our trials this Lenten season, let us improve on our successes and reduce our failures beyond the 40 days. More importantly, we must ask ourselves this question: Are we doing this in love? And not just any love, but Agape love. Jesus, being the epitome of this type of love, gives us this love not to keep for ourselves but to give to others to radically transform a world that is lacking this love. Historian Dr John Henrik Clarke once said, "If you want to change the world, you need to change yourself. And if you want to change yourself, you must first love yourself."

THE SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM

Jesus answered (Nicodemus), "Amen, amen, I say to you, no one can enter the kingdom of God without being born of water and Spirit." -John 3:5

Catechism of the Catholic Church 2nd edition paragraph 1215 states "Holy Baptism is the basis of the whole Christian life, the gateway to life in the Spirit (vitae spiritualis ianua), and the door which gives access to the other sacraments. Through Baptism we are freed from sin and reborn as sons of God; we become members of Christ, are incorporated into the Church, and made sharers in her mission: "Baptism is the sacrament of regeneration through water in the word."

It is through this sacrament of initiation that we enter a new life with Christ and fellow believers.

Faith communities are built and nourished with committed believers. At Our Lady of Africa, it is important that we share what the sacred gift of Baptism has brought us and develop a deeper faith-filled relationship with all those who wish to have their children baptized. We are a faith family of believers and for any relationship to grow, it requires commitment, attention, and mutual intentional care. In that light, parents who desire Baptism for their child must be parishioners at Our Lady of Africa, attend Mass regularly, and attend a mandatory baptismal preparation class.

Baptism requests will be confirmed upon submission of the following requirements:

- 1. Completion of the application.
- 2. Parents and Godparents attend Baptismal Prep Class.

Families can decide to have the class via Zoom or meet in person with Ms. Carter. Only 1 Godparent is needed, but 2 are acceptable. Godparents should attend the class even if they will not be physically present on the day of the Baptism.

Requirements for Godparents

The Catholic Church requires the following of Godparents: (canon 874.1)

The godparents are to be chosen by the parents or guardians. They are to be at least sixteen years of age. They must be Catholics who have already been confirmed and have received the holy Eucharist. They should be leading a life in harmony with the faith, i.e., practicing Catholics (attending Mass), if married, in a valid Catholic Marriage, etc. They may not be the father or mother of the one to be baptized. You may choose one or two godparents. If you choose two, one must be male and the other female. The godparents must have the qualifications and intention to carry out this duty.

PLEASE NOTE:

**Non-Catholic Witness (Can.874.2) A baptized person from a non-Catholic ecclesial (church) community may be admitted as a witness to baptism but only with a Catholic Godparent. This person is not formally called a Godparent but will be referred to as a Christian Witness.

Children aged 5 and up are encouraged to attend Sunday school regularly to help them also learn about their faith.

Adults interested in Baptism are encouraged to enroll in the Order for Christian Initiation for Adults (OCIA) and will be baptized at the Easter Vigil Mass.

Public Baptisms (baptisms during Mass) are available at the following times within the next two months:

April 14th, May 26th,

Private baptisms are also available by appointment.

The suggested donation offertory for baptisms is \$50.00.
