"LAUDATO SI', mi' Signore" - "Praise be to you, my Lord". In the words of this beautiful canticle, Saint Francis of Assisi reminds us that our common home is like a sister with whom we share our life and a beautiful mother who opens her arms to embrace us. "Praise be to you, my Lord, through our Sister, Mother Earth, who sustains and governs us, and who produces various fruit with colored flowers and herbs".

This month of March, we pay particular attention to the care of our common home...Mother Earth.

Consider a "fast" for Creation Care... sacrificing some comfort, giving up a wasteful practice, or modifying your actions to reduce harm to the environment. Some ideas include:

- A Meat Fast: How about adding a meatless Monday to meatless Fridays? What about eating only chicken when you do eat meat, or sustainably caught fish?
- An Energy Fast: How about turning the thermostat down 2°-5° F lower than usual and putting that sweater on? And maybe turn the water heater down to 120° F and only take 3-minute showers?
- A "Stuff" Fast: Buying only the bare minimum of essentials you need and simplifying your life? And how about staying away from as much plastic as you can and minimizing your waste stream?



2nd Sunday of Lent - Reflection by Father Tracy O'Sullivan OCarm

Dear Friends.

In all three cycles of Lent, each Second Sunday's gospel focuses on the Transfiguration. This gospel episode is obviously an important element of our Lenten journey. Our task is to let it truly enlighten us as we prepare to celebrate the great act of love that is the Passion, Death and Resurrection of Jesus.

The key to the passage in all its beauty and complexity are the words of the Father: "This is my beloved Son with whom I am well pleased; listen to him." (Mt 17:5)

Right before this, Peter had recognized Jesus as the Messiah only to deny his mission to suffer and die. (Mt 16:13-23) Now the Father is once again inviting Peter and us to take Jesus in all of his truth, not just a diluted version to fit our limited standards.

In rebuking Peter, Jesus challenged all of us to lose our life, to take up the cross and to follow him. (Mt 16:24-25) The event of the Transfiguration is our invitation into the mystery of the Suffering Messiah. Like Peter, we are called to try to balance the seemingly contrary truths of Jesus as Messiah and Jesus the Crucified Savior.

The Father's words tell us it is as God's Beloved Son that he will suffer and die. Our task is to embrace Jesus on his terms and "Listen to him." (Mt 17:5"

Peter had a long journey ahead of him. Only slowly did he learn to "Listen to him." (Mt 17:5) Eventually, he did indeed learn to let both the life and teaching and especially the Pascal Mystery of Christ be his model. Jesus became a map and a guide. Not doubt, his recalling the experience of the Transfiguration helped him to

face the darkness of life.

It is the same with us. As we face the seemingly endless challenges of good and evil: whether the war in Ukraine or the unending gun violence, the turbulence of our political scene or the burden of the distortion and abuse of the multiple expressions of our sexuality, or the simple but relentless demands of family life or the various passages in life from beginning school to aging. All these, and so much more, call us to "Listen to him." (Mt17:5) He is the Beloved Son.

Lent is a time to prepare to celebrate the Death and Resurrection of Jesus the Christ with new joy, stronger faith and growing love. This is the great mystery of our faith and that opens the mystery of our life

As many times as we have heard the story, it still holds the seeds of light and wisdom, of hope and tenderness. It reminds us how close God is to us and how thin the curtain between the divine and human truly is. We are always on the edge of our human frailty and mortality. Equally, we are on the threshold of eternal life and happiness. Whether it is the brokenness of our relationships, the consequences of sin, or the corruption of our world, we need to search the depths of our hearts and "Listen to Him!" (Mt 17:5) He will reveal anew that the last word is not sickness, injustice, prejudice, and the foibles of nature's awesome power or even death. The last word revealed in the Crucified and Risen Christ is life and the victory of love. Once again, our journey to Jerusalem in Lent and, more so in our life, is an invitation to enter into the mystery. This mystery joins the Divine and suffering in the suffering and glorious Messiah. It leads to the victory of Easter.

- Anyone age 6 months and older is eligible to receive a COVID-19 vaccine
- All Chicagoans age 5+ should get a COVID-19 booster dose at least 5 months after completing their initial vaccination series
- Anyone age 50 and older or people over the age of 12 who are moderately or severely immunocompromised should get a second mRNA booster (Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna) at least 4 months after their first booster dose

Laudato Si is an encyclical that Pope Francis published in May of 2015. It begins with the word "Praise be to You" (Laudato Si), and its subtitle is "Care for our Common Home." As people of faith we honor God through our engagement with creation.

Pope Francis calls the earth "our common home" which is like our Sister and our mother. By harming the environment, we damage that familial relationship and also we damage the relationship with other human beings, particularly those least equipped to defend themselves: the poor and future generations.

The Pope stresses that we are all connected. Therefore I the Pope does not only address Catholics, but all people since we are united by the same concerns.

Pope Francis does not shy away from speaking clearly about the many symptoms of environmental degradation, the impacts of climate change, depletion of fresh water and the loss of biodiversity. Poor countries are suffering more than rich countries even though they contribute less to climate change. Many migrants leave their homes, because of environmental degradation in their countries. Even here in Chicago we see how industrial polluters built factories in poor areas. None of the metal shredding facilities, for example, will be placed on the North side of the city.

At times these problems seem overwhelming, and we ask ourselves what can we do? Pope Francis encourages us to prayer and contemplation, learning more about nature, and to live intentionally. Look at how we are wasteful in our daily lives, and think about how to reduce this waste by recycling, composting and other means. But the Pope also encourages us to enter the arena of national and international politics, pushing back against leaders who prioritize short term gains and instead advocate for policies that support the disadvantaged and advance the long term common good.

The encyclical Laudato Si has inspired a spirit-led movement all over the world with many thousands of people participating in all five continents.

Pope Francis call us right here at Our Lady of Africa to join the Laudato Si movement. To that end you will find a **Creation Corner** in our Sunday bulletin with suggestions for action that we each can take to impact change in our environment, our communities, our world.
