25th Sunday in Ordinary Time Reflection by Gardis Watts

Our world is fractured because it is ruled by systems like racism, sexism and capitalism. These systems produce a hierarchy that creates a certain underclass of people who are constantly abused and subjugated by the people who created these systems of oppression. And when these systems are allowed to operate, injustice becomes prevalent. And when you have a society that is slight of justice, you have little peace and a lack of love. Bitterness, hatred and indifference spread like a virus and our society is infected with this sickness. In the Kingdom of God, you don't have this type of problem.

In our gospel reading for this week, we find Jesus giving one of his many recorded parables illustrating the Kingdom of God. The parable is the laborers in the vineyard. A landowner went out early in the morning to find people to work in his vineyard where he negotiates a set pay for them. He later finds several other laborers throughout the day looking for work and he hires them as well. At the end of the day, the landowner tells his foreman to pay all the workers the amount he agreed to pay the ones he hired in the morning. He also told the foreman to pay the last hired first. When the ones hired first saw they got paid the same amount as the others, they complained to the landowner. They accused him of treating them dishonestly because they worked the longest and they should be paid the most. The landowner retorted and told them that he paid them the amount they gareed on, which was a denarius. He also told the early workers that his generosity should not be their focus of envy. And when Jesus ended the lesson, he completed it with, "the last will be first and the first will be last."

Just like today, Jesus lived in a world where oppressors unjustly exploit and subdue the oppressed. In this parable, Jesus revolts against the standard rule of society. The parable starts off with a landowner, who we have to assume has some sort of wealth. This is significant because Jesus in the parable describes the landowner going out hiring workers. In a world where the caste system is the rule, why would a wealthy landowner expose himself to poor labor peasants when he has a foreman to do that? This was intentional by Jesus to break the social divide. A wealthy man going out hiring day laborers and negotiating terms of their pay was unheard of in that time. The landowner represents a privileged person who situates himself with those who society might consider the downtrodden.

The morning laborers bring an important insight to the parable because they are the ones who complain to the landowner about their wages. They become the critics of the other laborers, noting to the landowner that they feel entitled to more since they worked the longest. They forget that they are victims under the same system as the other laborers while attempting to serve the system as persecutors. Some biblical scholars think that Jesus' purpose of the morning laborers was to represent the Pharisees. These are the same people who question Jesus' interaction with sinners and tax collectors, showing them mercy while calling the Pharisees 'brood of vipers' (Matt 12:34). But who represents the 'morning laborers' of today? Is it the ministers who constantly condemn through their pulpit instead of teaching love? What about members in the church who see spiritually and emotionally broken people in their church wondering why they are here? Could it be working class people who look down on the homeless as pariahs? Is it the six-figure income person who looks at people on welfare as leeches? Are they the modern-day black person who feels that racism is not that big of a deal because they made it? We must ask ourselves the more important question: When are we the 'morning laborers' in our lives?

In Jesus' teaching of the kingdom through these parables, he takes societal norms and flips it over as he did with the table of the money changers in the temple (Matt 21:12). Are we courageous enough like the landowner to break the partitions set up by caste that prevent those with means to help with the destitute? Or are we the 'morning laborers' who are less concerned about others and only think of ourselves? This is the dilemma we are faced with in this parable. Let us find ourselves building the kingdom where no one is abused and the ones who require the most help get the most help.




