We've Come This Far By Faith

In 1987, the Office of Evangelization, under the direction of Rev. Pat Brennen, approached the Black Catholic Community about having a revival. In October of 1988, we had our first Black Catholic Revival at Holy Name Cathedral. We were excited about all the Black Catholics in Chicago coming together for this event. At that time there were more than 80 Black Catholic parishes. Walt Whitman, founder of the Soul Children of Chicago, put together a mass choir for the event. There were over 100 voices that participated. The revivalist was Rev. Jim Goode, OFM. The church was filled with Black Catholics and those affiliated with the Black Catholic Community. The procession featured African drummers and liturgical dancers. Oh, what a timewe had over the 3 nights.

Over the next several years we continued to have the revivals at Holy Name Cathedral with guest revivalists from around the country such as Fr. George Stallings, Sr. Thea Bowman, Rev. Bede Abrams, Rev. Giles Conwill, Fr. Ray East, just to name a few. In the early 2000's there was a resurgent reminiscence of the early Black Catholic Revivals. It was over 3-days, but it was at 3 different sites. The last Archdiocesan Black Catholic revival took place in 2010 at Old St. Mary's Church with Rev. Jim Goode as the revivalist.

Revival is an act or instance of reviving: the state of being revived. To be revived is to bring back to consciousness or life. After the devastation of the COVID19 pandemic with its shutdown and isolation from one another, there are many that have not returned to the church building and have opted to watch online. It is time for a revival. There is no longer an Office of Black Catholics nor an Office of Racial Justice however, there is still have a large contingent of Black Catholics in Chicago and there is still racism in the Archdiocese. It is time for a revival. In 2016, the Archdiocese of Chicago implemented the Renew My Church process, which has reduced the number of Black Catholic churches down to 9, where have all the Black Catholics gone? It is time for a revival. Frustrated with church closings, many Black Catholics have been through multiple church closings, have become fed-up and disillusioned with the church. It is time for a revival. Our churches are aging and there is a lack of youth and young adults, but what are we offering them? It is time for a revival.

This year's Black Catholic Unity Revival, on October 16, 17, & 18, is sponsored by the Chicago Black Catholics Alliance (CBCA) in collaboration with the 3 church sites, is a way to bring together once again Black Catholics and others from around the city & suburbs of Chicago.

The CBCA is a lay-led group comprised of current Catholic Theological Union (CTU) Tolton Pastoral Ministry scholars and Tolton alumni. The group was formed to address the lack of communication in the Chicago Black Catholic community with the demise of the Drum Newsletter that was previously distributed by the Office of Black Catholics and then later by the Black Catholic Initiative. The CBCA started distributing the Pulse Newsletter in February 2022. *The Pulse* is emailed out around the first of every month. The second



goal of the group's mission is to host the upcoming Black Catholic Unity Revival. The third goal is to have sessions like the longstanding Theology on Tap that take place in the summer.

The Black Catholic Unity Revival 's theme is "Authentically Black and Truly Catholic: Faith, Peace, and Love In Unity." The subthemes are (1) looking back: where we have been, (2) Where We are now and (3) Where we are go-

ing. The format is very similar to past revivals but with a little twist. This revival format will include a segment called, "Word on Fire." It is a theological reflection on the theme for each night. Gardis Watts, current Tolton scholar and founder of the CBCA, saw this same concept at a Jesus Week Revival at Fellowship Baptist Church during Holy Week. In our version, three Black Catholic theologians, Dr. Mark Nimo (St. Moses the Black), Dr. C. Vanessa White (CTU), Dr. Kimberly Lymore (St. Sabina & CTU) will offer their reflection on the theme for each night. The revivalists will be Rev. Mark Thomas Ameh, MSP (Sts Martha, Mary and Lazurus), Rev. Carl Gales, SVD (Our Lady of Africa) and Rev. Michael Pfleger (St. Sabina). Each night will include an African Dummer to call us to worship and a cultural expression by a young person, adult and youth choirs and liturgical dancers. This revival is a Sankofa moment in which we look back to move forward. As we navigate this new normal, ALL Catholics, whether you are African American, from the diaspora, Afro-Caribbean, Afro-Latinx or just need spiritual renewal, we are all in this together and that we need each other to survive and thrive. We have come this far by faith, leaning on the Lord. Trusting in His Holy Word, God has never failed us yet. Oh, oh, oh, can't turn around, we have come this far by faith!

Meet the Revivalists

Three men from very different backgrounds will be tasked on October 16, 17, and 18th to uplift and help unify a community that has been, battered, bruised and left dazed and confused over the past 5 years. From Renew My Church, which has left a number of parishes to close and unify to Covid-19, that has seen a number of people not survive a 100 year pandemic, it has been a challenging season. Now with the seeds of renewal that have been planted, through the power of the Holy Spirit, a Revival is being held.

Revivalist: Fr. Mark Thomas Ameh, MSP



Born into a Catholic Family in Nigeria, Father Mark Thomas Ameh is a "Cradle Catholic." Growing up in the Catholic faith, he started to go deeper into the Catholic tradition when he was a teenager. During this time, he interacted with people from Protestant traditions asking him questions about the Catholic faith and what do the rituals, principles and traditions mean. To answer those questions for himself, Father Mark went into a journey of self-discovery and went deeper into his Catholic faith. He started being involved in several ministries while praying and studying. As he continued down this road to discover more about the Catholic faith, Father Mark during his high school years was being noticed by several people suggesting him to consider the priesthood. They noticed certain gifts about him that would make him a successful priest. As he con-


tinued in his education, he got the opportunity to enroll in seminary school after high school. Through him being a member of Missionary Society of St. Paul of Nigeria, Father Mark was ordained into the priesthood in 2006. He credits his love for teaching, music and traveling for helping him maintain his position as a priest.

He spent his early priesthood years in Africa, particularly Nigeria and Chad. Father Mark identifies his work in Chad as his most successful missionary work to date. After spending six years in Chad, his mission took him to the United States of America. He was assigned to St John the Evangelist Catholic Church in Port Arthur, Texas where he served for five years. After he completed his assignment at St. John, Father Mark was assigned to St. Joseph, Husband of Mary Roman Catholic Church in Las Vegas, Nevada. When he completed a successful ministry in Las Vegas, he was reassigned to Chicago earlier this year where he is the pastor of Saints Martha, Mary & Lazarus parish on the far south side.

Father Mark will be the revivalist on October 16th at St Simon of Cyrene (St. Martin dePorres site) on the west side. His hope is to speak to Black Catholic Chicago where he wants to walk with them on their journey to be heard. He believes that Black Catholic Chicago still matters in the Catholic Church if they just organize as a community. Father Mark encourages Black Catholic Chicago to continued to be rooted in the Catholic faith. He hopes this message resonates and stresses that the church needs a place for the youth. Father Mark feels that the church needs to mentor the youth towards leadership so they can carry the church after we are long gone. Join us with Fr. Mark Thomas Ameh, MSP at 6:30 pm.

Revivalist: Fr. Carl Gales, SVD



The past year has been one of many changes for Fr. Carl Gales, SVD. This young priest grew up in the COGIC church memorizing bible scripture and singing in youth group. Fr. Carl became Catholic in college while studying and receiving a BA in music performance/piano. His life before priesthood was as a concert pianist. The question "What is my purpose" led Carl to come back and work in the church. For several years, he was focused on "How do I want my life to be expressed"? Musical and Liturgical expression became important to him. Yet, there was still a small voice inside of him that was letting him know that this was not quite it. As much success and affirmation from others, as he was getting about his work, he knew that it was not enough. A job at a couple of SVD parishes led him to meet and become friends with twins Fr. Chester and Charles Smith who were regular celebrants at the church where he worked. The Divine Word Missionaries' commitment to Black Catholics is what

attracted him to the order. Soon, Fr. Adam McDonald, the vocational director, had reached out to Fr. Carl. After a second call a year later, it led to dinner, a come-and-see visit in Chicago, and another one in Iowa, and by May of 2022, Fr. Carl Gales, SVD was ordained a priest and his first assignment was to serve at associate pastor of the newly formed Our Lady of Africa parish in the Bronzeville community.

In April 2023, Fr. Carl Gales was asked to serve as administrator of Our Lady of Africa Parish. He said yes. This new role has been full of new responsibilities and challenges that he has met with the spirit-filled vigor that parishioners have come to enjoy in his dynamic homilies.

For Fr. Carl, his greatest joy has been the weekend masses celebrating with the people and sharing their lives. Getting to know people and journeying with them is fulfilling for them and him. He stated that "As I try to lift people up, they do the same for me." Parish life is relational. It is all about encounters. As one focuses on the encounter rather than the transaction, one understands the mission of evangelization. He has also learned that the needs of the parish do not fall squarely on his shoulders. There are many people that he can rely on to help him shoulder the needs of the parish. Yet sometimes parish life is filled with the unexpected. From a leaky roof to the air conditioning going out, parish life can be a challenge. For Fr. Carl, it is the unexpected things that come up and he must gauge what issues need to be taken care of immediately. His personality is to solve problems, yesterday. The challenge is to realize that a lot of issues that come up daily may not have an immediate answer. His learning curve has been to learn to calm down, not be anxious, and let time take care of certain challenges that may come up. Or as his wise mother says, "Give time, time."

When asked about his hope for Black Catholics in Chicago, Fr. Carl would like Chicago to be a model of what future evangelization can look like for Black Catholics across the country. The Black Catholics of Chicago are a sign of resilience, making "good trouble" and proof that God never abandons his people. This resilience shows that despite the number of parishes that were affected by the Renew My Church process, several parishioners have made the intentional effort to share their time, talents, and treasures and continue to help the parish thrive, defying the odds of failure by their sheer determination. They have chosen to never give up no matter the obstacles that they may be faced with including those within or by outside forces. For Fr. Carl, it is important that we first take a hard look at our own selves and make the necessary adjustments for a successful future. Sometimes we must begin with the Man or Woman in the Mirror in order to make a positive change for the future. Join us with Fr. Revivalist: Fr. Michael L. Pfleger



Pastor, preacher, teacher, parent, lecturer, activist, radical disciple, "Blue Eyes, Black Soul," are just a few names that describe, Rev. Dr. Michael Louis Pfleger. Ordained as a priest for the Archdiocese of Chicago on May 14, 1975, he is still very active at the age of 73 as he was at 26, when first ordained. Following the example of a mentor and friend, Rev. George Clements, he became a parent, when he adopted an 8-year-old son, Lamar. In 1992, a South Korean women saw a story about him and sent her son, Beronti, to the United States to be adopted by Fr. Mike, as he is affectionately called by everyone. In 1997, he became a foster father to Jarvis Franklin, who was tragically killed because of gang crossfire, around the corner from the church, on May 30, 1998.

In 1966 when civil rights activist Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King marched through Marquette Park in Chicago, Rev. Pfleger witnessed his friends' parents spewing hateful words, spitting, and throwing rocks at Dr. King.

He wondered what inner strength Dr. King possessed that he responded, "we love you." This placed Rev. Pfleger on a trajectory that would change his life. While attending seminary at St. Mary of the Lake in Mundelein, Rev. Pfleger would come Chicago to hear the well-known Black preachers like Rev. Clay Evans, Rev. T.L. Barrett and Rev. Dr. Jeremiah A. Wright, Jr. He wanted his ministry to be in the black community. He also ministered on the West side of Chicago where he would help, Fred Hampton and the Black Panthers give out food to the residents. Once ordained, he was immediately assigned to St. Sabina Church. When he became pastor in 1981, he was told by the Archdiocese that St. Sabina would be closing in 3 years. Pastor Pfleger said, "not on his watch."

In the 47 years of his pastorate, The Faith Community of St. Sabina has survived and thrived to become known around the world for its vibrant liturgies and its social justice activism. The campus of the Faith Community of St. Sabina consists of the Employment Resource Center (ERC), The ARK (Youth center), St. Sabina Social Services and the St. Sabina Elders Village in collaboration with Catholic Charities, St. Sabina Academy, MLK Center for Strong Futures (assist justice-challenged youth and young adults) and the Stein Learning Gardens and the Samaritan Building (low-income housing).

As a minister of the Gospel, Pastor Pfleger has sought to break down the walls of racism and denominationalism by building unity among all people founded on truth and based on Jesus' command to love one another. He is known as the "radical disciple" because he follows Jesus, who was radical. He is a prophetic preacher and leader because he is not afraid to speak truth to power.

We look forward to hear what wisdom Rev. Pfleger has to offer the Black Catholic Community as we move towards the future. Join us with Fr. Michael Pfleger as the revivalist on the third night of the revival on Tuesday, October 18th at the faith community of St. Sabina beginning at 6:30 pm.

Word on Fire Speaker: Dr. Mark Nimo DMin.



Dr. Mark Kwaku Nimo, DMin. was born in Ghana, West Africa and grew up in a town called Cape Coast, on a University Campus, where his father taught Psychology. He worships at St. Moses the Black Parish with his wife and daughters. At Moses the Black, Dr. Mark is Director of Evangelization, Coordinator of Faith Formation, is part of the praise and worship music team and teaches the religion courses at the Augustus Tolton Catholic Academy. His other ministries at the church include, Balm In Gilead (B.I.G.), for those experiencing loss and grief and Ministers of Care in which he visits the sick and homebound, issuing Holy Communion and praying with them for healing.

Prior to being here in Chicago, Dr. Mark did lay missionary work in Uganda, East Africa for two years and has also ministered in 45 countries all around the world. He believes that the heart of the Catholic Christian faith is conversion and that the Gospel (the Good News), provides the path to fulfillment of all our human desires. He feels that every heart is hungry for meaning and purpose and that Discipleship and Mission along with everything we do must serve this purpose in some way.

When asked about his thoughts on the revision and reconstruction going on in the various church communities, he speaks about how as individuals, who are part of the Church, that there is a tendency in all of us to hold on to what is familiar and want to stay with the security of how things were. However, the future of the Catholic community is in God's hands and the Church is alive to the extent that its members are alive in Christ. On reflections about serving in the community, Dr. Mark says his greatest joy is knowing that he is trusted to participate in Jesus' mission when he visits the sick and brings them Communion and to serve his family. When asked about his biggest challenge, he remarks that it is helping people focus on the "one thing necessary" and dealing with distractions like in Luke 10:38-42 (when Jesus visited Mary and Martha). People are anxious and restless and worried about so many things and have forgotten to choose the ONE THING NECESSARY.

As Dr. Mark will be speaking on one of the upcoming evenings of Revival this month, he was asked about his thoughts on the event: I think "revival" sounds too weak for me at this time in the Black Catholic Community. It suggests that someone passed out and is looking for revival or resuscitation. I prefer "RESURRECTION." That is my hope! Truth be told, there are aspects of our life that are "dead" and need raising back to life. I am claiming the resurrection power of Jesus over my life and that of our community. The Greek word is "ANASTASIS!" Let this be an "Anastasis" moment for each of us. Word on Fire Speaker: Dr. C. Vanessa White, DMin



Professor, Womanist theologian, mentor, friend are just a few words to describe C. Vanessa White, D. Min. She is tenured Associate Professor of Spirituality and Ministry at Catholic Theological Union in Chicago and Director of the Certificate in Black Theology and Ministry. She holds a dual appointment as Associate Director of the Th.M. Program (Master of Theology) at Xavier University's Summer Institute for Black Catholic Studies.

Dr. White is the oldest of three (younger sister and brother). She was baptized Catholic at the age of 10 and attended St. Kilian Elementary School, where she was educated by the Adrian Dominican Sisters. She comes from generations of Methodist, Apostolic and Baptist ministers. That family legacy of ministry and service continues through her today.

Her life witness has encouraged many Black Catholic lay people to pursue a vocation in ministry, me included. She has a Master of Theological Studies with emphasis in Mission and Cross-Cultural Studies (1991). and a Doctor of Ministry with a concentration in Spirituality (2005) from Catholic Theological Union. She pursued further post-graduate studies at Loyola University Chicago and Xavier University of Louisiana.

She is a member of the Catholic Theological Society of America, the American Academy of Religion (AAR) and the Society for the Study of Christian Spirituality and the Black Catholic Theological Symposium, where she served as convenor. She is also a member of the National Black Storyteller Association as well as the National Association of Storytellers.

Her articles and essays are extensive. Her recent contributions to the study of spirituality include the chapter entitled "Deep Down in My Soul: Black Women and the Spirituality of Freedom: Reading the Signs of the Times" in the book *Religion, Women of Color, and the Suffrage Movement: The Journey to Holistic Freedom*. (Lexington House, 2022). Her reflection on the Feast of Pentecost can be found in Catholic Women Preach (volume 1) that was recently published by Orbis Books (2022) She is co-editor of the book, "*Songs of Our Hearts and Meditations of Our Souls: Prayers for Black Catholics*. (St. Anthony Messenger Press), is a contributor to the Black Catholic Studies Reader (David Endres, editor, CUA, summer 2021) and to the Wisdom Commentary series volume on Luke, 1-9 (General editor, Barbara Reid, Liturgical Press, 2020) Dr. White was an inaugural contributor for the *GIVE US THIS DAY*, daily prayer booklet published by Liturgical Press as well as the Catholic Women Preach web series.

In February of 2023, she became the first lay woman invited to preach a nine-day solemn novena in honor of St. Jude at the National Shrine of St. Jude which was livestreamed globally. In 2023, she was appointed by Cardinal Blasé Cupich as a delegate for the North American Intercontinental Stage of the Synodal Process.

A womanist practical theologian, her research is focused on the intersections of spirituality and praxis and is attentive to issues of discernment, health, racial justice, diversity/intercultural dialogue, women's spirituality, leadership development, spiritual and ministry formation, spiritual practices, lay ministry, adult faith formation and issues pertinent to the life of Black Catholics.

When asked about her hopes for this revival and/or the Black Catholic Church, she said, "my hope is that there will be a re-awakening or renewal of our sense of community, unity, identity as Black Catholic people of faith and an understanding of our own agency as Black Catholics." We are looking forward to her presentation on the second night of the Black Catholic Unity Revival. Join us for Dr. C. Vanessa's White's vibrant theological reflection on the 2nd night of the revival on Tuesday, October 17th at Our Lady of Africa parish beginning at 6:30 pm.

Word on Fire Speaker: Dr. Kimberly Lymore

Prophetically and unapologetically speaking truth to power, Dr. Kimberly Lymore, DMin doesn't mince words when she sees that the church she loves is not living up to her full potential. As part of the Faith Community of St. Sabina since 1983, social justice, racial equity, and inclusivity for all of God's children have been at the forefront of her ministries. After leaving corporate America as a systems analyst and pursuing full-time ministry in 2000, she was appointed the full-time Pastoral Associate by the Rev. Michael L. Pfleger on September 1, 2000.

Kimberly is responsible for all the sacramental preparation of the children and adults. She is the team leader for Eucharistic Ministers and is on the preaching rotation for the 8:30 service. She is currently the convener of the Black Catholic Theological Symposium, as well as the Director of the Augustus Tolton Pastoral Ministry Program at Catholic Theological Union (CTU). Kimberly Lymore received her Master of Divinity with a concentration in Word from CTU and she received her Doctor of Ministry from McCormick Theological Union. Her thesis article was titled, "God Doesn't Tilt: Making the Connection Between Worship and Justice." Her goal is to be obedient to the plan God has for her life and obedient to his Word.

In talking with Dr. Lymore about why a revival is needed and the relationship that the Black Catholic community has with the Archdiocese, she stated that, historically, Black, and other Catholic ethnic groups have looked to the Archdiocese for support. This support can include schools, the opening of parishes, and various events and programs to uplift one's catholic identity while celebrating one's culture. With the advent of the closing of the Office of Black Catholics and the Office of Racial Justice, it has created a void of advocates who would be at the table to discuss the needs of the community. The creation of the Black Catholic Initiative was supposed to fill that void, however, there has been little funding or support allocated to it. One invests time, treasures, and talents in things that they care about. The lesson is that we as a community must become self-sufficient and work together otherwise, more parishes could face realignment and/or closure in the future.

For Dr. Lymore, she hopes that this revival encourages the community to continue to be collaborative, supportive, and unified. This is the only way to survive and thrive. She also wants people to see that lay-led endeavors are one important way to support the community. Dr. Lymore also recognizes that there is separation and/or division between African Americans and our brothers and sisters from the larger African diaspora. Her hope is to build a unified community by being more inclusive of one another's gifts so we can begin to come together as a cohesive community.

When I asked Dr. Lymore, why is it important to continue to serve in the church in spite of some of the challenges, she told me that as a lifelong Catholic, Dr. Lymore was baptized when she was 5 years old at Ascension parish in Harvey, IL, she has made an intentional choice to stay and hold the church accountable to be the Church that Jesus commissioned her to be. Ultimately, it is easier to work for change from within than being on the outside. Archdiocesan Day of Renewal

On a late September day that began with the last vestiges of rain and rain clouds and ended with the warmth of the sun, the Archdiocesan Day of Renewal was held at Rosemont Theatre. Over the course of eight hours, lay leaders and clergy were invited to reflect upon the transformations that have taken place since Renew My Church was first enacted in 2018.

With Dr. Mark Nimo as the MC, Fr. Matt O'Donnell, pastor of St. Moses the Black Church, reminded the leaders that God is constantly calling us to something new. Using the Genesis story of Abram and Sari who later became Abraham and Sarah we were reminded that the power of change means that we must be willing to trust and let go of control. There is an understanding that there is fear of the unknown and where that will lead us, but we must trust that the transformation will make us all stronger and more united. We must have the courage to say yes and embrace new strategies ultimately trusting where the Holy Spirit will lead us. Tyrone Pittman with an ensemble of musicians led the leaders in spiritfilled song.

Cardinal Cupich then led the leaders on a refresher on the parts of the Mass and the importance of Christ's invitation to us and the community to join more fully in his work. He challenged the audience to consider how we encounter Christ through the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist and to consider ways that we live a self-sacrificial life and how our parishes serve the world around us.

Cardinal Raniero Cantalamessa joined the gathered via video and reminded us of the essential role that the laity has in evangelization out in the world. Our lives should be a living reflection of Christ on Earth inviting others to join us to serve God and one an-

Fr. John Riccardo from Detroit suggested that we must have clear directives about what our mission is when it comes to evangelization and discipleship. When it comes to questions about discipleship, we must look at what we are being asked to do. The disciple's mission is to build the city of God here on earth. We are the hands and feet of the Lord. It is through our Baptism in the Holy Spirit that we can Catch the Fire, Experience the Fire, and Spread the Fire. It is through our personal experience and relationship with God and our testimony to others that we can accomplish this mission. The fruits of the Holy Spirit are our tools, and we should pray for the grace of magnanimity.

In addition to the main speakers, two-panel discussions took place about evangelization and discipleship. Members of the panels included lay leaders and clergy from various parishes. It is worth noting that there was no representation from the remaining Black Catholic parishes on the panels. Some parishes are using the Alpha program to engage people. A catechist reminded the audience that faith is caught, not taught through relationship and encounter with Christ. We can also strengthen our relationship with Christ through the Eucharist and provide opportunities for radical conversion for those who seek it. The day ended with Mass and a renewed commitment to go out and make disciples in the name of the father and the son and the Holy Spirit. -Tina L Carter





Prayer for October


Father God,
